On April 23rd, 2023, Howard County Chinese School (HCCS) Youth Journalist Group and PTA SGA cordially invited the professional journalists John Sullivan and Adrienne Lu and hosted a youth education seminar about Journalism.

Mr. Sullivan is an investigative reporter-in-residence at American University's School of Communication and an associate investigative editor at The Washington Post. Mrs. Lu is a senior reporter for The Chronicle of Higher Education. Both of them shared their stories how they are inspired and motivated toward Journalism. John also shared the investigative story that won the Pulitzer Prize and the impact his team made to the school system structure. At the end of seminar, they provided invaluable advice to **HCCS** Youth Journalists and Chinese American students in the Howard County Chinese School.

John Sullivan

John Sullivan is an award-winning investigative journalist with extensive experience covering a range of topics, from politics and government to science and health. He is currently an Investigative Reporter-in-Residence at American University's School of Communication, an associate investigative editor at The Washington Post, and the acting Executive Editor at The Investigative Reporting Workshop.

Prior to joining American University in 2013, John served as a faculty member at Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism. He also spent nearly a decade at The Philadelphia Inquirer, where he was a member of the paper's investigative team and covered the war in Iraq, state government, city hall, science, and health.

Throughout his career, John has been recognized for his exceptional reporting, earning numerous national awards, including the Pulitzer Prize, the Casey Medal, and the IRE Award. His reporting has brought about significant change, forcing officials to address systemic failings and prompting reforms in areas like the city's child welfare system and the criminal courts. He holds a master's degree in journalism from the University of Missouri, where he worked for the National Institute of Computer Assisted Reporting and also spent five years reporting at The News & Observer in Raleigh, NC.



Adrienne Lu

Adrienne Lu is a highly respected senior reporter for *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, she has established herself as a leading voice on college students and politics in higher education. Her insightful reporting has covered a range of topics, from students' sense of belonging, state legislation to restrict colleges' efforts to improve diversity, and student debt.

Adrienne previously wrote about education and state and local governments for Stateline, The Philadelphia Inquirer, The (Bergen County) Record, The (Raleigh) News & Observer, and the Chicago News Cooperative. She also studied state and local government fiscal health as a researcher at The Pew Charitable Trusts. She is a graduate of Williams College and holds a master's degree in public administration from Columbia University.

#### YAP ATTENDED SMOB CONVENTION

The 21st of March, 2023, may seem like a regular school day to some students, but for the other 138, it was something special: the SMOB Convention.

To know about the SMOB Convention, it is important to understand what the SMOB is. The SMOB, or Student Member of the Board, is a position on the HCPSS Board of Education (BOE) that voices the concerns of the student body. They "can vote on all issues except issues pertaining to budget, personnel, or other restricted matters" (Student Member of the Board (SMOB) | HCASC). The SMOB is chosen by the SMOB Convention, which includes three delegates from each middle school and six from each high school. The delegates are expected to be representatives of their school and choose the candidate that would best represent the student body. The process normally takes a whole school day and this year, the delegates had 16 wonderful and diverse applicants to choose from.

Three members of the Howard County Chinese School AAPI Youth Ambassadors Program were present at the SMOB Convention, representing voices of the AAPI youth community. These members include: Grace Chen, a sophomore at Marriotts Ridge High School; Mabelle Liu, an 8th grader at Mount View Middle School; and Mark Li, an 8th grader at Folly Quarter Middle School.

During the convention, the delegates were first introduced to the process

of the convention as well as a history of the SMOB. Once split into four groups, the delegates had the chance to meet all of the applicants and learn about their experiences, platforms, and personalities. Then, there was a round robin, where the delegates had the opportunity to ask the candidates questions. After that, they were given time to discuss and think about who they wanted to vote for. During this time, other activities such as interviews and makeshift photo booths were held while delegates were called to vote

After a day of consideration and anxiousness, the two HCPSS students competing for the SMOB position were decided: Howard High School junior Lamia Ayaz and Wilde Lake High School sophomore Antonio Clay-Hardy!

The experience of the SMOB Convention was very educational and it is always inspiring to see youth get involved in their community. It is very important to engage and participate in such activities, and becoming a SMOB Delegate is one of many ways to
